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## Rationale

The revolutionary character of artificial intelligence technology (AI) is already having an inevitable impact on every aspect of society and therefore on the Church and individual Christian living. AI presents opportunities and challenges requiring a serious engagement grounded within our confessional heritage. Scripture and our Standards affirm God's sovereignty over all creation, the sufficiency of Scripture to guide to our faith and practice, and our call to exercise dominion with wisdom, which includes taking responsibility for technological innovations and their intended or unintended effects. AI's growing influence is wide-reaching, ranging from sermon or educational preparation tools to major career realignments to potential "deepfake" evidence, and many other areas. It impacts pastoral and church ministry, Christian vocation and education, apologetic confrontations with new ideologies, significant impacts on the quality of human relationships, and other ethical and theological questions that need attention. There is a serious risk of losing critical thinking, knowledge, and wisdom as such skills are surrendered to AI. The PCA must shepherd its members and proclaim the gospel faithfully amidst these rapid changes, and a modest investment of \$15,000 annually can enable a study to help the Church with a biblical guide for their Christian witness under these new conditions.
